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# Speakers and Debaters



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## Benjamin Almassi

Associate professor of Philosophy at the Governors State University, where he teaches courses in political philosophy, environmental ethics, medical ethics, interdisciplinary studies and logic. He is the author of *Restorative Environmental Justice in a world of Wounds*, published later this year by Lexington Books; other recent publications include “Epistemic injustice and its improvement” (2018) and *Climate Change and the Need for Intergenerational Restorative Justice* (2017).

## Carla Boin

Lawyer, mediator and facilitator of restorative circles in the areas of Family, Education and the Environment. PhD in Restorative Justice from the Faculty of Law of the University of São Paulo (USP). Coordinator of the 1st Training Course of Instructors in Restorative Justice of the Court of Justice of Bahia (2019–2020). Instructor member of the National Register of Instructors of the Brazilian Consensual Justice. As a member of the team of experts linked to the Chair of Agribusiness, of the Higher School of Agriculture “Luiz de Queiroz” (ESALQ–USP), she introduced the themes of Mediation and Restorative Justice in the chapter that dealt with Legal Certainty, the government plan presented to candidates for the Presidency of the Republic, during the 2018 elections. Founding partner of the Mediation and Restorative Justice Portal. She took part in the organization of the “1st Brazilian Symposium of Restorative Justice: An arm of the Culture of Peace”, in Araçatuba – SP (2005). Author of books and articles on Mediation and Restorative Justice in Brazil and abroad.

## Chiara Perini

Since September 2012, Chiara Perini is Associate Professor of Criminal Law at the University of Insubria (Como–Italy), teaching Criminal Law, Restorative Justice and Mediation of Victims and Offenders, Corporate Criminal Law. Before becoming a Researcher in Criminal Law at the same university. She became a lawyer in the Bar Association of the city of Milan (Italy) in 2003. She was honorary judge of the Court of Justice for the application of the sentence in the city of Milan in the period 2005–2010.

## Eduardo Assad

Graduated in Agricultural Engineering from the Federal University of Viçosa (UFV), has a master’s and doctorate from the University of Montpellier, in France. Since 1987 he is a researcher at Embrapa. From 1993 to 2006, he was Technical – Scientific Coordinator of Zoning Climate Risks in Agriculture, Ministry of the Environment. He currently coordinates the National Greenhouse Gas Inventory of the Ministry of Science and Technology. Collaborator in the Master Course in Agribusiness of the Getúlio Vargas Foundation (FGV). He works at the Observatory of Low Carbon Agriculture (ABC) of the Getúlio Vargas Faculty and GV AGRO.

## Egberto de Almeida Penido

Judge of Law of the Court of Justice of the state of Sao Paulo with training in Transformative Mediation, Nonviolent Communication and Restorative Justice, developing projects and actions in this field since 2004. Specialist in Systemic Law. Member of the Coordination of Childhood and Youth of the Court of Justice of the State of São Paulo. Coordinator of the Work of the Restorative Justice Management Group of the Court of Justice of the state of São Paulo. Member of the Restorative Justice Management Committee of the National Council of Justice. Trainer and Tutor by the National School of Training and Improvement of Magistrates (ENFAM).

## Grazia Mannozi

Professor of “Criminal Law” and “Restorative Justice and Mediation of Victims and Offenders” at the University of Insubria (Como–Italy), where she is also director of the Center for Restorative Justice and Mediation Studies (CeSGReM) and of the Master’s program in Restorative Justice and Humanistic Mediation. For the year 2019, she is president of the Working Group on Restorative Cities Established at the European Forum for Restorative Justice. In 2013 and 2017, she was a member of two different Italian legislative commissions, the first to reform the sanctions system, the second to reform the application of punishment and promote restorative justice. In her research activity, she focused mainly on sentencing systems, restorative justice, economic crimes, corruption, corporate responsibility, law and language. Her publications were translated into several languages. In 2017, she published the first Italian manual of restorative justice, entitled “La Giustizia Riparativa. Formanti, Parole e Metodo”, Giappichelli, Torino (with G. A. Lodigiani).

## Janet Murdock

She was the coordinator of the 12 million dollar project portfolio of the United Nations Peace–Building Fund in Guinea–Bissau.

In this capacity, she helped write new projects, oversaw management and provided technical assistance to 12 peace–building projects implemented between 2016 and 2020, covering topics such as dialogue and national reconciliation, justice reform through restorative justice and AMR, and youth and women’s leadership development. Previously, Murdock was a programme specialist at the UNDP Pacific Center’s Crisis Prevention and Recovery Unit in Suva, Fiji, where she headed the UNDP Pacific Center’s main peace–building programme for the Pacific region and four Fiji–focused peace–building projects. In the South Pacific in 2011, Janet was an independent consultant for 2 years, during which she wrote an RPP study on peace building in Mozambique 17 years after the war by the CDA, examined the governance of oil revenues in Sao Tome And Principe for the International Alert, wrote an ICAF for the U.S. Department of State in Nicaragua, and developed a series of case studies on high–level OAS interventions in Latin American conflicts for the OAS Department of Political Affairs. Janet was the first female peace, rule of law and development consultant for the United Nations in Guinea–Bissau in 2008/09 and prior to that, she was director of training for partners for democratic change, where she was responsible for designing and implementing training programs in change and conflict management processes, including negotiation, mediation, cooperative advocacy, social cohesion and consensus facilitation in various thematic areas in Latin America, Europe and the Middle East. In her role at the organization of American States (OAS) from 2003 to 2006, she contributed to the strategic vision and design of a new conflict prevention and resolution unit, its programs and projects in Latin America.

In the last four years of working with ADR Vantage (1999 – 2003), Janet has worked as a workplace mediator, facilitator and designer of mediation systems for 12 agencies of the U.S. Federal Government, the World Bank and the Inter–American Development Bank – for whom she developed one of the first mediation training programs in Brazil.

## João Salm

Associate Professor, Department of Criminal Justice – Governors State University – GSU, Chicago. He taught at Simon Fraser University – SFU (2010–2015) and the University of Alberta (2012–2013) in Canada. In 2010, together with Professor Elizabeth Elliott, Brazilian judges and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Canada, he founded the International Cooperation between Canada and Brazil in Restorative Justice.



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## Josineide Gadelha Pamplona Medeiros

Judge of the Court of Justice of the State of Pará (TJPA), member of the State Coordination of Restorative Justice and the Managing Committee of Restorative Justice in the National Council of Justice (CNJ). PhD in Society, Nature and Development, the Environmental Sciences Area, Federal University of West Pará (UFOPA) and master in law, with emphasis on Human Rights, Federal University of Pará (UFPA).

## Katia Herminia Martins Lazarano Roncada

Federal judge since 2002, filled in the 5th Court-Cabinet of the Federal Special Court of São Paulo (JEF-SP). Specialist in Civil Procedural Law at the University Extension Center. MBA in public management by Getúlio Vargas Foundation (FGV). Coordinator of the Center for Restorative Justice of the Judicial Section of São Paulo. Member of the Restorative Justice Management Committee of the National Council of Justice. Trainer and Tutor of Magistrates by ENFAM.

## Nirson Medeiros da Silva Neto

Professor at the Federal University of West Pará (UFOPA), where he coordinates the Restorative Justice Clinic of the Amazon (CJUÁ). Postdoctoral fellow at the Department of Social Psychology and Labor at the University of São Paulo (USP), PhD in Social Sciences, Area of Anthropology, and master in law, with emphasis on Human Rights, at the Federal University of Pará (UFPA).

## Maike Kumaruara

Activist of the Indigenous Awareness Group, an institution that advises the indigenous movement of the lower Tapajós, member of the Unified Black Movement, Pará.

## Marcelo Salmasso

Judge of the Court of Justice of the state of São Paulo with training in Transformative Mediation, Nonviolent Communication and Restorative Justice, developing projects and actions in this field since 2004. Member of the Restorative Justice Management Group of the Court of Justice of the State of São Paulo. Member of the Restorative Justice Management Committee of the National Council of Justice. He was part of the Working Group of the National Council of Justice, formed in the years 2015 and 2016, for the creation of the CNJ Resolution 225/2016, and Rapporteur of the regulatory proposal. Secretary for Restorative Justice of the Association of Brazilian Magistrates (AMB) since 2016. Coordinator of Restorative Justice in the Center for Studies of the São Paulo State Association of Magistrates (APAMAGIS) since 2015. Member-collaborator of the Coordination of Childhood and Youth of the Court of Justice of the State of São Paulo. Coordinator of the Center of Restorative Justice of the Region of Tatuí - São Paulo. Trainer and Tutor by the National School of Training and Improvement of Magistrates (ENFAM).

## Roberto Rodrigues

Agronomist and Farmer, Coordinator of the Agribusiness Center of the Getúlio Vargas Foundation (FGV), FAO Special Ambassador for Cooperatives and chair holder of Agribusiness of the University of São Paulo (USP). He takes part in numerous business, institutional and academic councils. He has been a professor in the Department of Rural Economics at the Universidade Estadual Paulista (UNESP) in Jaboticabal. He was President of the Superior Council of Agribusiness of Fiesp (Cosag), the Organization of Brazilian Cooperatives (OCB), the National Academy of Agriculture of SNA and the International Cooperative Alliance (ACI). He was Secretary of Agriculture of the state of São Paulo (1993/1994) and Minister of Agriculture, Livestock and Supply (2003/2006). He has nine books published on cooperativism and agricultural policy.

## Viola Molteni

PhD student at the University of Insubria (Como-Italy). In April 2019, she graduated in law from the University of Milan, with a thesis entitled "The probation mechanism: regulation and practice between non-punitive instances and restorative justice". She has worked as a lawyer in a law firm in Milan, gaining experience in the field of white-collar crime and corporate crime. In October 2019, she was admitted to the Doctoral Program "Law and Life Sciences", held by the University of Insubria. The objective of her research activity as a doctoral student is to explore the potential of applying the restorative paradigm to environmental crimes.

## Zysman Neiman

Bachelor in Biological Sciences and Doctor of Psychology (USP), he is currently a Researcher and Associate Professor of the Department of Environmental Sciences of the Federal University of São Paulo (Unifesp), where he is a researcher and professor of The Graduate Program in Integrated Environmental Analysis - PPGAAI, on campus Diadema, Unifesp. He was coordinator of the Implementation Committee of the Institute of Cities - Unifesp. He is a collaborator of The Graduate Program in Biodiversity Conservation and Sustainable Development of the School of Environmental Conservation and Sustainability (ESCAS). Member of the Interagency Committee of Environmental Education of the state of São Paulo (CIEA-SP), and of the Brazilian Forum of Climate Change (FBMC). He served as Chairman of the Physis Institute - Culture & Environment, is leader of the Network of Political Action for Sustainability (RAPS). He was one of the authors of the Transversal Theme "Environment", of the National Curriculum Parameters (PCN) for elementary school of the Ministry of Education. He is the author of several books in the area of ecology, education, environment and sustainability, and is Editor-In-Chief of the Brazilian Journal of Environmental Education.
